## Summer 2023 What is a Neighbor?

Leviticus 19:18 is often quoted "Love your neighbor as yourself," but what does that mean? Are neighbors the same as friends? Or are we more of the Robert Frost mindset: "Good fences make good neighbors"? Many of us find interactions limited with our neighbors in the cold months. Bundled up, we come and go from our warm homes. Summertime offers us more possibilities to interact with our neighbors. But what do we experience when we do?

Irish poet John O'Donohue describes our milieu: "In post-modern culture there is a deep hunger to belong. An increasing majority of people feel isolated and marginalized. Experience is haunted by fragmentation... Society is losing the art of fostering community. Consumerism is now propelling life towards the lonely isolation of individualism. Technology pretends to unite us, yet more often than not all it delivers are simulated images. [...] It seems that we are in the midst of a huge crisis of belonging. When the outer cultural shelters are in ruins, we need to explore and reawaken the depths of belonging in the human mind and soul; perhaps, the recognition of the depth of our hunger to belong may gradually assist us in awakening new and unexpected possibilities of community and friendship."

In a time when our culture has drawn lines, how might we make connections? In an age of loneliness and isolation, how might we give and receive with our neighbors? Can we learn from our many varied experiences with our neighbors? The Bible speaks out of cultures markedly different from our own. In addition to Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan, are there any texts that speak to how we interact with our neighbors?

Local writer Shannan Martin has been very intentional in developing neighborly relationships. Her *Neighbor's Blessing* has inspired the Summer Worship Committee, and we have made copies for all Assembly households. Look for the green cards in your mailbox or on the literature table. We are delighted that Shannan will be with us in worship on June 25.

- Say thank you and give a small treat to someone working in the community (construction worker, trash truck, UPS truck, mail person)
- Go for a walk, saying hello to those you pass (find a path with neighbors on it!)
